Our second year living through the pandemic continued to challenge our community. Those searching for help turned to us. Here's how JFS rose to the challenge.

The older adults in our community continued

to be even more vulnerable during this time.

We helped **1,373 older adults** by providing critical services to meet their needs. We

supported their emotional well-being with friendly phone calls from volunteers. We

helped them stay connected to loved ones

iPhones. And we sent 1,122 "Thinking of you"

by teaching them how to use tablets and

packages to Holocaust survivors.

6,934 calls were answered by our Resource Center. Callers were greeted with a friendly voice offering assurances, resources and connections to services.



- **99%** of older adults served felt they had sufficient services and support to continue living safely in their home
- 189 older adults received assistive technology services
- 28,385 rides were provided
- **48,566** Kosher Meals on Wheels were delivered
- **324,609** hours of home care services were provided
 - **643 Holocaust survivors** received a range of services
- Mental health issues remained in the forefront for all of us as JFS worked to provide help for those struggling. We offered counseling services for children and adults. And we continued to offer online support groups for those seeking comfort during this difficult time.
- **91% of individuals felt their quality of life and well-being were improved** with counseling services
- 451 individuals received counseling services



JFS kept the community engaged and feeling supported by offering **51 virtual programs with 2,048 participants.**

As we navigated our pandemic world, individuals and families continued to find themselves in crisis. We helped families that were experiencing financial difficulties and ensured their basic needs were being met. We made sure they had a roof over their heads, enough food on the table and a plan to help them get back on their feet.

$\mathbf{600}$ households received services


\$691,153 emergency financial assistance was provided to 911 household impacting 4,289 people.
